Framing the Future of Highlands School District

Last school year, as the Highlands Assistant and Substitute Superintendent, I had the opportunity to get to know the school board members, administrators, principals, teachers, secretaries, paraprofessionals, custodians, maintenance, food service, and several parents and community members. The one thing that all of these people have in common is their care for our students and our community. This quality is one of the reasons that made me want to become the next Highlands Superintendent.

This past summer, I worked with district administration and the board of school directors to establish district goals for the next 5 years, themed "Framing the Future". The ultimate goal is for every Highlands student to gain the knowledge and skills needed in order to be successful after high school graduation. Our students will be equipped with the necessary skills required to be successful in any chosen career path. To accomplish this, we will continue to utilize

the Understanding by Design Framework for teaching in order to enhance the district's curriculum, instruction



and assessment. We plan to improve the Multi-Tiered Supports System (MTSS) Framework for students in grades K-8 who need remediation or enrichment in English, language arts and/or math. We will also utilize the MTSS Framework to provide additional supports for students experiencing emotional or behavioral difficulties. Principals will be instructional leaders, increasing their presence in the classrooms and providing the necessary resources and tools for our teachers. In turn, teachers will provide rigorous and meaningful instruction to our students.

Another significant goal for the Highlands School District this year is to increase student attendance. It is crucial that children attend school on a regular basis to receive the best education possible. If students do not come to school, then we can't educate them, and they won't learn. Parents and guardians, please help us accomplish this goal!

Communication is the key to any successful relationship. This school year, I implemented Superintendent Coffee Talks, Student Cabinets at each building and a district-wide Parent Cabinet, all of which are designed to encourage important conversations with me about the positive things happening in the school buildings and things that may need reviewed.

Finally, fiscal responsibility will remain a top priority in the 2019-2020 school year. It is my duty to make decisions in the best interest of our students while being fiscally responsible. Every decision I make will be based on what I believe is best for our students, and I will never waver from that. The students are at the heart of everything we do. District Welcomes New Administrators to Team



Dr. Cathleen Cubelic, Assistant Superintendent

Serving the district as the new Assistant Superintendent is **Dr. Cathleen Cubelic**, who held the same position for the past two years at Wilkinsburg School District prior to joining the Highlands administrative team in August.

Dr. Cubelic began her impressive educational career as a teacher and assistant principal at North Allegheny. She was a former assistant principal at Chartiers Valley, elementary principal at Hampton and the Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment at the Midwestern Intermediate Unit. A graduate of Duquesne University with a B.S. in Elementary Education and M.S. in Administration, Dr. Cubelic earned her Superintendent Letter of Eligibility from Gannon University and her Doctorate in Organizational Leadership from Youngstown State University. She received numerous awards

and recognition throughout her career, including the Pennsylvania Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development (PASCD) President's Award for Distinguished Contributions to Education in 2017. Dr. Cubelic worked in partnership with Edulink Inc. in the development of the Pennsylvania Electronic Teacher Evaluation Portal (PA-ETEP), supported the implementation of standards-aligned reporting, and led the development of PA Core-aligned Common Assessments.

Some of Dr. Cubelic's responsibilities include grant writing, staff professional development, teacher induction and teacher tenure evaluations. She works closely with Curriculum Coordinator Cathy Russo to oversee curriculum, instruction, reporting academic progress, MTSS and standardized assessment. Dr. Cubelic also serves as the district's homeschool/homeless coordinator and the safety and security coordinator.

Academic Performance through Understanding by Design Framework

In order to align our curriculum to state standards and in an effort to improve student achievement, Highlands implemented stage 1 of the **Understanding by Design (UbD) Framework** last year.

The UbD Framework is a three-stage process that helps teachers clarify learning goals, devise assessments of student understanding, and develop effective and engaging learning activities while working within the standards-

driven curriculum. Using a "backward" design, the teacher starts with classroom outcomes, creates aligned assessments and performance tasks and then plans the instruction, choosing activities and materials that help determine student ability and foster student learning.

The ultimate goal is for students to connect their skills and knowledge to *understand* the "big idea" in the material being taught so they can transfer what they learn in any situation. This philosophical application of *understanding* is more effective in preparing college and career ready students.

Under the leadership of Assistant Superintendent **Dr. Cathleen Cubelic** and Curriculum Coordinator **Cathy Russo**, Highlands educators will continue to expand on all three stages of the UbD Framework this year in an effort to reduce gaps in academic achievement and increase student growth. It is important to note that improving student achievement is a process; it may take about 3-5 years before the district sees a significant increase in achievement. However, Highlands does expect to see a steady academic growth pattern develop each year with the combined use of the UbD Framework and intervention support for students.



Launched in November 2018, the **Future Ready PA Index** is the result of discussions with thousands of educators, parents, advocates, policymakers, and business leaders across Pennsylvania about how communities should evaluate schools.

The Future Ready PA Index's user-friendly website includes the measures of academic performance and growth, along new measures such as college and career readiness and chronic absenteeism, providing the public with a more comprehensive look at how our schools are educating students.

At the November School Board agenda planning meeting on Nov. 11, Assistant Superintendent **Dr. Cathleen Cubelic** will present the district's Future Ready PA Index data from the 2018-19 school year.

Rams Reflection Room: An Alternative to School Suspension

Highlands Middle School and Highlands Elementary School implemented the concept of a Rams Reflection Room (RRR) this year in an effort to reduce the number of out of school suspensions and teach students a reflective approach to inappropriate behavior.

According to the Johns Hopkins Institute for Educational Policy, researchers found that years of punitive measures have produced harmful consequences for students, and suspended students are more likely to fail courses and become chronically absent. To address these issues, school districts nationwide (including Highlands) have explored the use of preventive, early response disciplinary models such as reflective practices to reform school discipline while reducing punitive measures.

Highlands Middle School Principal **Dr. Kimberly Price** and Elementary Principal **Ms. Samantha Perlik** researched the best reflective practices and put a plan in place for a Rams Reflection Room at HMS and HES. The RRR *does not replace* school suspensions; rather, based on the incident, principals have the option to assign a day or two in the reflection room as an *alternative* to suspension.


Staffed with a behavior specialist, the RRR provides the opportunity to teach students about respect, empathy, accountability, and responsibility through written reflective practices. Through direct instruction, students are taught about Conflict Resolution, Character Education and Social Emotional Learning. Students in the RRR also continue their academic school work at two intervals throughout the day.
