Students who serve their community will have a greater connection to that community, and therefore a greater connection to the school, which is also part of that community.

In a class like this, discipline is absolutely paramount. The students are held to a higher standard through a merit and demerit system. This increased personal discipline and attention to academic excellence as a primary focus helps them to be successful in other classes as well.

### What is H.E.S.A.?

In the Highlands School District, there are four independent municipalities. They include Brackenridge Borough, Fawn Township, Harrison Township, and Tarentum Borough. These municipalites are protected by nine independent volunteer fire companies.

The leaders of these fire companies and municipalites want to be proactive instead of reactive. They want to keep our volunteer companies in business, and this requires recruiting new and young members.

These leaders formed an alliance, and proposed the idea to the school district as a possible elective class for Highlands High School. Approved in 2007, the new elective class was implemented at the high school for the 2008-09 school year.

Our program is now leading the way and other school districts and communities are following our example. In the summer of 2010, the Fireman's Association of the State of Pennsylvania recognized the efforts of the members of our alliance with the Recruitment and Retention Award which was sponsored by Provident Insurance.

The fire companies have seen an increase in new and junior memberships.

### What is Working

#### SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

In the fall of 2008, the members and companies of HESA held a community safety fair. While the community members viewed our equipment and also learned a lesson in safety, the parameters of a challenge grant was being met. Five Hundred people needed to show and be impacted by our event to meet the challenge of the grant.



The alliance has formed an important partnership with the ALLEGHENY KISKI HEALTH FOUNDATION and by way of this Challenge Grant has estab-

lished a \$25,000 Scholarship Fund for students of the HESA program.

The alliance has also secured grants from the State of Pennsylvania to obtain textbooks and other basic equipment for this program. The program has been implemented with a minimal expense to the school district.

### **Future Plans**

The alliance is proud of its acomplishments, but wants to see the program continue to grow. One proposal is to create a second class, and perhaps a second level to the class to allow the students to complete more of the introductory training of the fire service.

A local company is replacing its fire engine, and wants to donate the truck that is being replaced to the alliance and this program.

Leaders of the alliance are working hard to pursue grant funding for a training complex to be built on the school campus. This would allow for a greater amount of practical training to occur during the school day, and would benefit the local companies by increasing their ability to train existing and senior members to remain on the cutting edge of this profession.
