READ ACROSS AMERICA COMMUNITY READERS DAY

Read Across America Week was a blast at HES with daily themes, reading activities, and guest speakers. During Read Across America Week, 2nd grade teacher, Ms. McCurdy organized a schoolwide Community Readers event for students in grades 1-4. HES hosted over twenty visitors who shared a children's book with students and gave an overview of what career path they chose and why.















FIRST GRADE FIELD TRIP

In March, First grade students went on a field trip to the Pittsburgh Children's Museum! They explored and created in the Kindness Gallery, Makeshop, Garage, and Art Studio. First graders also had the opportunity to discover different habitats and learn about nature's diversity in Charley Harper's I Am Wild exhibit.

They used a stream table as a model to compare multiple solutions designed to prevent water from changing the shape of the land.
