Co-Teaching

- Utilizes Speech teachers, Title I teachers,
 Instructional aides and Learning Support Teachers
- Grades 3 and 5 blend homerooms and break students into groups of about 10 students to one teacher for small group instruction and maximizes opportunities for learning.
- Grade 4 utilize homeroom teaming model to teach students using the same resources listed.

Co-Teaching con't

 Grade 3 co-teachers asked to try a variation of SpellRead for their students, as the majority were struggling readers. Heather Wirtz, certified SpellRead teacher and trainer, trained a team of 5 to teach needed components of SpellRead to increase word attack and word identification skills. Some students have gone from below grade level in these areas to one to three years ABOVE grade level in these areas!

Flex Groups/RtII

- Have undergone several transformations

Flex Groups/RtII

- Title I services students with the greatest need
- Remaining students utilize centers to meet targeted needs
- Allows teachers to service "their" students; rapport has been established and students are receptive to instruction
- Time allotted for research based interventions to be taught with fidelity for Tier III students
- Positive feedback from teachers AND students.

RAMS 100

- Similar to the Middle School's Principal's 200
- Students are awarded RAMS 100 tickets by any adult in the building for displaying RAMS behavior. (Eleven tickets awarded weekly)
- After the ticket is awarded, the student brings the ticket to the office for a treat, signs the autograph book, and draws a number.
- The ticket is placed on the RAMS 100 board in the corresponding number.
- Weekly calls home are made by the principal to notify and congratulate students and parents.
- When a "bingo" occurs, all 10 students in that row win the mystery prize, that is housed in a balloon on the board. The group pops the balloon to reveal the prize.
- Prizes have included: Lunch in the office with a friend, dessert with Mrs. Hauser, pizza with the police, sundaes with the social worker.
