Back to School!

Students Begin 4 Days In Person March 29

A little over a year since last year's nationwide Covid-19 pandemic lockdown, many Highlands students will begin to experience a sense of normalcy on March 29 as they return to school in person for 4 days a week. Recommended by the Highlands School District Task Force following a parent survey that indicated overwhelming support of increasing in-person days, the Highlands School Board of Directors approved the plan on March 15. Options for full remote learning are still offered for families who do not feel comfortable having their children attend school in person.

Students returning to school in person will attend Monday through Thursday, with Friday remaining a remote learning day for all students. Students and staff will still need to wear a mask and adhere to social distancing guidelines. Due to the increased number of students in classrooms, on buses and in cafeterias and common areas, students will be distanced about 2 feet or more apart, depending on the location.

"I can't put into words how excited I am to have our students return to more in-person learning. This past year has been overwhelming, to say the least. Our students, parents, staff, and community continued to exhibit strength and resiliency throughout the entire situation. It is critical that we return our lives to some sense of normalcy; especially for our students who thrive off structure, routine, and social interactions. School is the place that provides our students with these opportunities. Our administration, faculty and staff are ready to focus on the academic, social,



and emotional wellbeing of our students and provide them with the supports they need to move forward with success!"

PSSA, Keystone Exam Delayed Until May

Recognizing the challenges the Covid-19 global pandemic is creating for schools, the PA Department of Education is allowing local education agencies to delay the assessments until either later this spring or in the fall. This decision complies with federal law while providing districts the flexibility in administering the assessments. This needed data will help the state to identify areas of learning loss and opportunities for learning acceleration. It will also help determine the inequitable impact of the pandemic on learners, including low-income students, students of color, English learners and students with disabilities.

Highlands students will take the PSSAs and Keystone Exams in May rather than in the fall. "We want to see how our students are doing and what areas we need to focus on going into next year," said Superintendent **Dr. Monique Mawhinney**. "We also plan to address skill deficits by providing relevant and rigorous summer programs."

Highlands Elementary

Designated by the state as a school for Targeted Support and Improvement for the 2020-21 school year, Highlands Elementary (HES) has focused on improving school attendance, re-establishing positive behavior interventions and support (PBIS) and increasing achievement on the PSSA.

During the second quarter, all HES students have obtained an average daily attendance of 92.07%, which is above their goal of 86%. Students who have monthly perfect attendance receive an award certificate from the principal. In addition, the homeroom at each grade level

that has the highest number of students with perfect attendance for the month earns an ice cream party, which is graciously sponsored by the Highlands K-4 PTO.

Winter Sports

The 2020-21 Highlands Winter Sports teams were able to successfully complete their sport seasons under the Covid guidelines and protocols. Congratulations to all of our student athletes and coaches!

Boys Basketball: The Varsity Boys Basketball Team won its *fourth straight section title*, even after jumping up to Class 5A. They finished the regular season with a 13-4 overall record and 9-1 mark in the section, earning themselves a No. 4 seed in the WPIAL playoffs and opening round bye. Sophomore **Jimmy Kunst** stepped up as the leading scorer at 17.3 points per game. He was named to the Big 56 Conference First-Team All-Section. Head Coach **Tyler Stoczynski** was named the Coach of the Year for leading the team to another section title. Senior **Wahkeem Roman** and junior **Carter Leri** were named to the Second Team, and senior **Antoine McDaniel** and sophomore **Chandler Thimons** received an Honorable Mention. For the first time in school history, the junior varsity team finished the season *undefeated*, going 16-0.

Girls Basketball: The Girls Basketball Team displayed their improvement from last year, finishing the regular season with a 9-12 record and 6-6 mark in the section. They won their last four regular season games. Junior **Maria Fabregas** led the team in scoring in the regular season with 12 points per game. Freshmen **Kalleigh Nerone** and **Jocelyn Bielak** have been two spark plugs in the team's success this season. Nerone averaged 10 points per game and Bielak, 8 points per

game. Junior **Jocelyn Luzier** led the defense with 20 blocks this season. They earned a No. 12 seed in the Class 4A playoffs and faced No. 5 Blackhawk in the first round of the playoffs.

Wrestling: The Wrestling Team was able to compete in eight matches and two dual matches, and was highlighted by junior **Jrake Burford's** postseason run. He finished 2nd place in the individual sectional tournament to advance to the Southwest Regional Tournament.

Swimming: The Boys & Girls Swimming Team had one qualifier each for WPIAL Playoffs. Sophomore **Aidan Ochoa** received WPIAL qualifying times in the 100 fly and 100 backstroke and finished 6th in both. Sophomore **Brenna Bonnett** qualified in the 100 fly and 100 breaststroke and finished 13th in both.
